Quirky, funny, stylistically interesting. Loved it!

Very Finnish. Tender and funny. Trademark Kaurismäki.

Unequivocally as this was a truly exceptional film IMO - (in my opinion) painful - tender and brutal all at the same time - the tenacious persistence of the female lead and the unrelenting conditions of labour at the hard edge of Super- exploitation in Helsinki not usually seen in the representation of what is taken as a high quality welfare society such as Finland - the undereducated or immigrant labour in crude demanding roles and occasionally in boss conditions. Witty and loving relations prevail.

I thoroughly enjoyed this romcom with its desert dry humour and offbeat characters and plot. Who needs a yak when you've got a pooch like that in the cast? Wishing you a very happy Christmas and a healthy and happy new year 2025.

Compelling storytelling with skilful use of silences but he manages to relate a story and create characters and their attitudes by light and low-key touches. The current events (war in Ukraine) features on the radio not immediately relevant to the story but added a sardonic backdrop to the human drama. Cast excellent, one of Aki's best. BTW the Society are to be thanked for the lavish party which was much appreciated.

I was really looking forward to this film but was rather underwhelmed. It was gentle and there was some dry humour but overall, I found it depressing and I realised I was not that interested in the fate of the two main characters.

I felt quite a miserable watch for Christmas, even though it was a love story.

It is very rare that I don't like a film at all. May be the fact that I expected a happy film for our Christmas film had an impact on how I felt. The reviews describe it as a feelgood and delightful comedy. For me it was a very gloomy pessimistic film. Everything is gloomy even the words of the songs in the karaoke bar. The news of the war in Ukraine doesn't help as it reminds us of the true reality of the world and each time she puts on the radio we're no longer in a fiction but brought back to a terrible reality. As the couple seems to get closer and finally there is a glimmer of hope, Holappa gets knocked over by a train and falls into a coma! Really! Some critics described the end of the film as happy! But is it? As they leave the hospital, we see Ansa walking at full speed with her dog while he struggles to follow her on crutches! Not a good omen for a healthy supportive relationship!

This film gave me a much greater insight into life for those who have so little financial support. It was full of humanity and featured disappointment and hope in equal measure. The desire to find someone to be yourself with and to love and be loved by, is the basis of fulfilment in many peoples' lives.

Full of Finnish stereotypes, amusing in places but overall, rather bleak. Maybe more entertaining if you are a Finn?

This film felt so fresh and different tonally, partly because of the suggested quirkiness of the Finnish but also because of the conceit of setting a film in the present day and seemingly, in the past all at the same time. It was strange but compelling to have news of the war in Ukraine every time the radio was turned but similarly to witness dated fashion, supermarkets, interiors and machinery. The film really did give us a glimpse into a very particular milieu which I didn't feel I'd seen before. I was pleased to see the two lonely and uncertain young people find their way together at the end of the film. Their lives seemed tough and yet the film managed to be witty, entertaining and uplifting despite this.

Moving and gentle film beautifully directed. Was it my imagination or did the woman look more attractive as the film and the love affair progress. Films from Finland are so subtle and really play with the emotions.

I enjoyed this sympathetic and humorous portrayal of two lonely people looking for companionship, having very much appreciated the previous screenings of *Le Havre* and *The Other Side of Hope*. However, I felt that Ansa's dog made a more reliable companion than Holappa! The regular radio news bulletins on the invasion of Ukraine by Russian troops were a worrying reminder that Finland shares a border with Russia.
